Communication and Language

- To understand a range of complex sentence structures including negatives, plurals and tense markers.
- To have conversations with adults and peers with back and forth exchanges, staying on subject and responding appropriately.

Mathematics

- To know some number bonds to 10.
- To subitise to 5 and beyond in irregularly patterns.
- To recognise numbers 0-20.
- To represent numbers 1-20 in different ways.
- To combine groups to find a total (within 10).
- To begin to take away (within 10).
- To recognise and make simple patterns.
- To recognise and make more complex patterns.
- To recall doubling facts to 5.
- To write numerals to 10.

Understanding the world

- To compare and contrast characters from stories, including figures from the past.
- To recognise that people have different beliefs and celebrate special times in different ways.
- To know about and recognise the signs of Summer
- To know some important processes and changes in the natural world including states of matter e.g. melting, floating and sinking.
- To compare different environments (linked to journeys).

Expressive Art and Design

- To know some similarities and differences between things in the past and now.
- To confidently talk about their time in Reception.
- To sequence changes in their life.
- To draw information from a simple map.
- To understand that some places are special to members of the community.

Literacy

Word Reading

- To be able to read short vowels with adjacent consonants CVCC CCVC CCVC CCV CCVCC.
- To be able to read words ending in suffixes: ing, -ed /t/, -ed /id/ /ed/, -ed /d/ -er, -est
- To begin to answer questions about what they have read.
- To use vocabulary that is influenced by their experiences of books.
- To recognise Summer 2 Phase 4 sounds and tricky words.
- To read simple sentences containing taught sounds.
- To read some words on sight.

Writing

- To form most lowercase letters correctly and begin to form capital letters.
- To begin to write longer words and compound words which are spelt phonetically.
- To write sentences using a capital letter, finger spaces and full stops.
- To read their work back and check it makes sense

Things to do

- Long hair should be tied back during the school day.

- We do ask that children bring in water to drink whilst in the classroom and they can bring juice for lunchtime if they wish.
